The Birth of Jesus


In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. 2 (This was the first census that took place while[a] Quirinius was governor of Syria.) 3 And everyone went to their own town to register.

4 So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. 5 He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. 6 While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, 7 and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

8 And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. 9 An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. 10 But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. In this edition of the Bulletin I am sharing news from Australia, Cambodia and the Philippines.



Cambodia

Mihae Lee reported on two important events in Cambodia in November 2024.

- WCTU was invited to the NCD (Non-Communable Disease) project campaign and received the certificate of appreciation. It was presented to CWCTU as they donated 1,300 temperance education books. The NCD project has been launched as one of Korea's ODA projects to enhance the Cambodian public awareness of health with the slogan of "prevention is better than treatment".



- 8 members (5 Cambodians and 3 Koreans) visited the All Nations School and educated 700 students from the elementary school students to the high school students.



Australia

The State of **South Australia** recently celebrated its 138th anniversary in their "Teatotallers Tearooms", an impressive part of their headquarters which has been developed to show their history and which is used by various groups for meetings.

WCTU South Australia has been playing an important part in encouraging and supporting temperance work in **Central Australia**, the hot, dry, relatively sparsely populated area centred on Alice Springs. There is currently only one member there, Sharon Bird, who does what she can to reach the indigenous women with our total abstinence message as well as with material assistance. The picture shows Sharon with one of these women and gifts. She wrote the account below about her recent trip to outlying areas.

Judyth and I have travelled to Ali Curung, Hermannsburg, Stuarts Well (Spuds), Atitiere. We visited the roadhouses at Wauchope, Barrow Creek, Gemtree. In all these places we left our WCTU FASD bandaids which were very well received. In Ali Curung WCTU provided children's activity books and stationery. Dawn Stark and Gweneth Macallen from Victoria, contributed to this. The small church there was very grateful, and we had a lovely time of prayer and worship with them. Another venture was the Harts Range Rodeo where we distributed bags with warm blankets and FASD and vaping information. The Rodeo attendees were



very grateful for the blankets for the kids as it was very cold. We thank God for keeping us safe as we travelled just under 1800 kms in the last few months. The ladies in community were very encouraging and really welcomed the message of the dangers to the unborn when using alcohol.

An FASD advertisement on the back of a bus is also being considered for Alice Springs where many babies are alcohol affected.

Philippines - 95th Anniversary, September 30th 2024

The theme of the celebration was "ACTIVELY PURSUING ITS MISSION TOWARDS A CHRIST CENTERED FAMILY AND VICE-FREE SOCIETY". The first part of the program was the Thanksgiving service with inspiring music led by the Methodist Church Choir of Malabon, followed by the tribute to the Three Pillars of the Philippine Woman's Christian Temperance Union - Don Teodoro Yangco, the benefactor and donee of the lot of PWCTUI; Atty Josefa Abiertas, founder and first president of PWCTU; and for Frances Willard, founder of the World Woman's Christian Temperance Union who hailed from Evanston Illinois U.S.A. President Perla E. Gunzon Introduced the Guest Speaker, Rev. Ptr. Jericho Ong who delivered the Inspirational message based on 1 Cor. 3:16 - "Do you not know that you are God's Temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?" which corresponds well with our advocacy on "No to Smoking, Alcoholic Drinks, and Drugs" (S.A.D.). In Ephesians 5:18, the apostle Paul said, "Do not get drunk on wine, which leads to debauchery. Instead, be filled with the Spirit" We are also reminded in 1 Thessalonians 5:22: "Abstain from every form of evil". The first part of the program was closed with the hymn, GREAT IS THY FAITHFULNESS, led by our invited choir.

The second part of the program started at 2:30 pm with the singing of the National Anthem, The President delivered warm greetings emphasizing the rationale and the projects/programs under the mandate of the different departments. Mrs. MARIA BELEN ANGELITA MATIBAG, Assistant Secretary and Executive Director for Operations of the DANGEROUS DRUGS BOARD (DDB) was our esteemed GUEST SPEAKER.

The guest speaker commended PWCTUI for the role it plays in securing and disseminating the goals and thrust of the PWCTUI with regard to the ill effects of Smoking, Alcoholism and illegal drugs. After the speech, President Perla E. Gunzon together with the Board of Trustees, presented a Plaque of Appreciation to her. Service Awards were given to President Perla E. Gunzon, Dr. Ramona Ines B. Raneses, Dean Betty I. Molina, Dr. Florita V. Miranda, and Ms. Merlita Estrellas. Ms. Virginia Sadorra was given a Recognition Award for serving as NOMELEC Chairperson of PWCTUI elections for five (5) decades.









Alcohol consumption among teenagers: Parents need to set rules and not just talk about it

When it comes to talking about alcohol consumption with their teenage children, many parents don't know where to start. The official drinking age across Canada ranges from 18 to 19 years.

Although alcohol consumption among young people has fallen, more than 80 per cent of them start drinking alcohol before the age of 17, according to data from Québec.

Many countries have introduced laws to prohibit the consumption and sale of alcohol to minors to avoid the harmful effects of alcohol on their developing brains. However, these laws are not enough to reduce consumption. The role of parents could also be decisive.

So what should parents say, and do, to help?

As researchers in psychology and criminology, we carried out a study based on a survey of 1,154 Belgian teenagers, published in 2024. We examined their perceptions of parental monitoring, laws and their acceptability, and their alcohol consumption. Parents were not consulted.

In Belgium, young people can drink certain types of alcohol, such as beer and wine, starting at age 16. This minimum age is one of the lowest in the western world.

The importance of parental monitoring during adolescence

The scientific literature clearly shows that parental monitoring helps to reduce alcohol consumption by adolescents.





This involves parental solicitation, i.e. asking questions to find out how youth spend their free time and with whom they associate. Parental monitoring also includes the rules that parents set for their children, both in general and with regard to alcohol consumption.

Rules specific to alcohol are not limited to prohibiting consumption. For example, some young people are allowed to drink with their families on weekends, while others are also allowed to drink with their friends or during the week. In terms of general rules, some teenagers must obtain permission to go out in the evening during the week and inform their parents of where they are going and who they are meeting.

Better to act than to talk

To reduce alcohol consumption among young people, it is better to rely on parental rules rather than daily discussions.

Our study shows that parental solicitation is not an effective way of preventing alcohol consumption. These results support several other studies showing that communication between parents and their children is not enough to prevent abuse. For example, some parents simply ask their youngsters about their activities and friendships so that they are aware of their outings, without setting any rules or expectations regarding their alcohol consumption.

Although it is vital to take action and establish clear rules about alcohol consumption, it is also worthwhile for parents to use a democratic parenting style. They should explain why they are not allowing their child to drink alcohol under the legal drinking age, as well as the reasons behind the rules established in their family. Parents could stress the importance of respecting the law, their personal values or explain the negative impact of alcohol consumption on brain development. The discussion should be open.
